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

creations go beyond the functional and even aesthetic properties of clothing, and interact with their surroundings. Showcasing six installations created between 2008 and 2013 by the Montreal designer and professor at Université du Québec à Montréal (UQAM)'s École supérieure de mode, Fashioning the Intangible: The conceptual clothing of Ying Gao renders the immaterial, material and the invisible, visible. How? Thanks to microphones, sensors and eye-tracking technology. The works and how they interact with the viewer in time and space playfully challenge commonplace ideas about clothing and its place and role within our environment. They put the transformative powers of fashion on full display. Gao—who also heads the product design department at the Geneva University of Art and Design in Switzerland—



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
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
